

A New Democratic Moment: Lessons for the Arab Spring

Washington, DC September 15, 2011

The Cannon House Office Building Caucus Room (Southeast of the Capitol on a site bounded by Independence Avenue, First Street, New Jersey Avenue, and C Street S.E.)

Until recent developments in the North Africa and Middle East, the spread of liberal democracy had stalled --- with Freedom House reporting a decline in the advance of democracy over the past five years. While developments in the Arab world hold the promise for a new democratic wave, the outcome of the Arab Spring remains uncertain and democratic progress in the region is unlikely to be linear. The conference is intended to highlight challenges and opportunities that nascent and prospective democracies face in today's world.

Conference participants will discuss the successes and setbacks of democracy over the past several decades and consider their implications for transitions currently underway in North Africa and the greater Middle East. Participants will also discuss the interrelation of democracy and development, and the need to ensure that democracy delivers improved lives for citizens in the Middle East, if recent advances are to be consolidated and sustained. The conference will also address the particular role of parliaments in democratic transitions, and the need to develop parliamentary institutions that are not only democratically elected, but that also govern democratically.

Responding to Authoritarian Capitalism and Helping New Democracies to Deliver Socio-Economic Development

Despite economic advances under the Chinese model of "authoritarian capitalism," events in the Arab spring remind us that, unless accompanied by political liberalization and democratization, this approach is unlikely to be politically sustainable over the long-run. What role do Western democracies play in ensuring that the authoritarian capitalist systems are forced to play on a level playing field with democratic market economies? How (and can) the West use economic engagement to support political liberalization in authoritarian capitalist systems, such as China and Russia? At the same time, however, new democracies find themselves under pressure to deliver rapid socio-economic development. This is particularly true in the wake of democratic transitions, where expectations for rapid socio-economic development are often unrealistically high. What role do parliaments play in "helping democracy deliver", particularly in the context of democratic transitions?

Examples of Belarus and Cuba shows that authoritarianism can be sustained even if it fails to deliver modernization. Actually, many observers – journalists, politicians, and activists - have been foreseeing the collapse of the Cuban regime at least since the end of the Cold War, yet Cuba persists. Cuba shares much in common with Belarus. Are Cuba and Belarus special cases with unique forces that do not operate elsewhere?
